What it Would Have Been Like to Be Jesus

- I. The person of Jesus Christ
 - 1. Jesus Christ is the Son of God (Luk 1:35).
 - 2. He is God manifest in the flesh (Joh 1:14; 1Ti 3:16).
 - 3. He is also a man (**1Ti 2:5**).
 - 4. He lived a sinless life (**1Pe 2:22**).
 - 5. He was sent to bare the sins of His people and save them (1Pe 2:24).
 - 6. He fulfilled all that was written of Him (Luk 24:44).
- II. What would it have been like to know all those things about Himself?
 - 1. We don't know when Jesus in His humanity became aware that He was the Son of God.
 - 2. At 12 years old He knew that God was His Father and therefore that He was the Son of God (Luk 2:49).
 - 3. He had been studying the scriptures and talking to the teachers of the law (Luk 2:46-47).
 - 4. He would have likely known that He was sent to bear the sins of His people and to suffer on their behalf (Isa 53:4-5, 10-12).
 - 5. Knowing this, He would likely have been a very serious child and a man of sorrows from early in life (Isa 53:2-3; Ecc 1:18).
- III. Consider the life of Jesus Christ and what is must have been like to be Him.
 - 1. Jesus was a carpenter before He entered the ministry (Mar 6:3) at about 30 years old (Luk 3:21-23).
 - A. He learned His carpentry skills from his step-father Joseph (Mat 13:55).
 - B. What would that have been like?
 - C. As a man, He didn't know everything, but had to learn things just like us (Heb 5:8).
 - i. His early work would have not been perfect just as any man's work is not perfect when He is learning.
 - ii. He would have been the best apprentice, always working diligently with a good and humble attitude.
 - D. Jesus worked with his hands.
 - i. He was not born into money (Lev 12:8 c/w Luk 2:22-24).
 - ii. He was not born into earthly royalty.
 - iii. He was a poor man while on this earth (2Co 8:9; Mat 8:20).
 - iv. He didn't have a prestigious job.
 - v. Nevertheless, He would have been diligent in His business and never slothful (**Pro 14:23; Rom 12:11**).
 - vi. He would have experienced getting splinters in his hands or hitting his thumb with a hammer, but he would have never reacted sinfully (**1Pe 2:22**).
 - vii. He might have had customers who were impatient when the job took longer than they thought it should have, but Jesus would have never responded unkindly to them (**1Pe 2:23**).
 - E. Jesus would have had to balance His duty to work to provide for Himself (**1Ti 5:8**) with His deep desire to study the scriptures (**Psa 119:97**) and to be about His Father's business.
 - 2. Jesus was a man who experienced all of the same emotions and troubles that we do.

- A. Consider the following emotions that Jesus experienced:
 - i. Hunger (**Mat 4:2**)
 - ii. Thirst (**Joh 4:7**)
 - iii. Joy (Heb 12:2)
 - iv. Love (Joh 11:5)
 - v. Anger (Mar 3:5)
 - vi. Sadness/tears (Joh 11:35)
 - vii. Fatigue/weariness (Joh 4:6)
 - viii. Social weariness (Mat 14:23; Mar 6:31)
 - ix. Sighing (Mar 7:34; Mar 8:12).
 - x. Frustration (Luk 9:41)
 - xi. Anxiety (Luk 12:50)
 - xii. Pain (**Heb 13:12**)
 - xiii. Violence (Mar 10:34)
 - xiv. Agony (Luk 22:44)
 - xv. Near insanity (Mar 14:33)
 - a. <u>Amazed</u> 1. Driven stupid; stunned or stupefied, as by a blow; out of one's wits.
 - b. Jesus was going crazy under the pressure of what He was going to face.
 - xvi. Depression (Mat 26:37)
 - a. <u>Heavy</u> *adj.* VII. Weighed down mentally or physically. 27. a. 'Weighed down' with sorrow or grief; sorrowful, sad, grieved, despondent.
 - b. <u>Despondent</u> *adj.* 1. Characterized by loss of heart or resolution; labouring under mental depression; desponding.
 - xvii. Grief (**Isa 53:3**)
 - xviii. Trouble (Joh 12:27)
 - xix. Fear (**Heb 5:7**)
 - xx. Astonishment (Mar 6:6)
 - a. <u>Marvel</u> *v*. 1. *intr*. To be filled with wonder or astonishment; to be struck with surprise.
 - b. <u>Astonishment</u> 1. Loss of physical sensation, insensibility; paralysis, numbness, deadness.
 - xxi. Being let down by friends (Mat 26:40)
 - xxii. Being hated (Joh 15:24-25)
- B. Jesus experienced and overcame all of these difficult things as a man, not as a superman who was out of touch with the human experience.
- C. The difference between Jesus and us is that He never sinned when He endured all of life's difficulties (**Heb 2:18; Heb 4:15**).
- 3. Jesus was self-educated.
 - A. He did not have formal theological training (Joh 7:14-15).
 - B. <u>Letter</u> *n.1* II. Something written. 3. a. *sing*. Anything written; an inscription, document, text; a written warrant or authority. b. *pl*. Writings, written records. *Obs*.
 - C. Jesus was intimately familiar with the word of God.
 - i. He studied the scriptures from His youth up (Luk 2:46).

- ii. Jesus referred to the "scripture(s)" at least 11 times during His earthly ministry.
- iii. Jesus said "it is written" at least 19 times (some of these are duplicates in the different gospels).
- iv. Jesus referred to "the law" at least 14 times (some of these are duplicates in the different gospels).
- v. Jesus referred to the "word(s)" of God at least 27 times.
- D. God taught Him what He knew (He received revelation from God) (Joh 7:16-17).
- 4. Jesus' life changed dramatically when He was called by His Father into the ministry at about 30 years old.
 - A. He went out into the wilderness to be baptized by His cousin John the Baptist in the Jordan river (Mar 1:4-5, 9).
 - B. John knew that Jesus was not an ordinary man (Mat 3:11-14).
 - C. When John baptized Him the Holy Ghost descended upon Him like a dove and the Father said from heaven that Jesus was His beloved Son (Mat 3:16-17).
 - D. His persecution by Satan ensued (Mat 4:1).
 - E. Jesus went from being an obscure carpenter to a famous traveling preacher (Mat 9:26, 31; Mat 14:1).
 - F. He healed the sick and multitudes flocked to Him (Mat 4:24-25).
 - G. He would never live a "normal" life again.
- 5. Jesus was a leader.
 - A. He chose 12 (Mar 3:14) average (at best) (Mat 4:18-22; Mar 2:14) men to be His disciples.
 - B. He was light-years ahead of them in maturity, understanding, and godliness (Mat 16:6-11; Mar 9:31-34).
 - C. They tested His patience, but He never mistreated them (Mat 17:14-21).
 - D. He often had to get away by Himself and commune with His Father (Mat 14:22-23).
 - E. Jesus would no doubt have been a lonely man while on this earth (at least in regard to human relationships).
 - i. Jesus was rejected by many which would make one lonely (Isa 53:3).
 - ii. In addition to that, Jesus was the leader of His disciples and would never have been able to just feel like one of the guys.
 - iii. No one could have possibly understood what it was like to be Him, the sinless Son of God who would be the sin bearer for an untold number of people.
 - iv. "The king that is not a lonely man is a fool." (Unknown)
 - v. There has probably never been a more lonely man that has ever lived.
- 6. Jesus was the promised Messiah of Israel.
 - A. But most of those to whom He was sent rejected Him (Joh 1:11; Luk 19:14).
 - B. Even His own siblings rejected him (Joh 7:1-7).
 - C. He did not enjoy the respect that the rabbis, Pharisees, lawyers, and teachers of the law did (Isa 53:3).

- D. Many that did recognize Him as the Messiah were only interested in Him because they thought that He would bring Israel back to its former power and glory (Joh 6:15; Luk 17:20-21 c/w Luk 19:11 c/w Act 1:6). (This was not the reason the disciples followed Him, but their question was indicative of what the Jews were expecting.)
- E. He spent time with common people (Mar 12:37) and saved-sinners like publicans and harlots (Mat 9:10-13; Luk 15:1-2; Mat 21:31-32; Luk 7:29; Luk 7:37-39, 47; Luk 19:5-7).
- 7. Jesus was betrayed and condemned to death.
 - A. He was turned on by a trusted friend (Mar 14:10-11; Mat 26:47-50 c/w Psa 41:9 c/w Joh 13:18).
 - B. He was forsaken by His disciples (Mar 14:50).
 - C. He was slandered by liars (Luk 23:1-2; Luk 23:10; Mar 14:55-56).
 - D. He was mocked (Mat 27:29-31; Luk 23:11).
 - E. He was spit upon (Mar 14:65).
 - F. He was scourged (Mat 27:26 c/w Isa 50:6 c/w Psa 129:3).
 - i. <u>Scourge</u> v. 1. *trans*. To beat with a scourge; to whip severely, flog.
 - ii. <u>Scourge</u> *n*. 1. a. A whip, lash. Now only *rhetorical*, with reference to the torturing of human beings, or to ascetic discipline.
 - iii. Whip n 1. a. An instrument for flogging or beating, consisting either of a rigid rod or stick with a lash of cord, leather, etc. attached, or of a flexible switch with or without a lash, used for driving horses, chastising human beings, and other purposes.
 - iv. Lash n. 1. a. gen. A sudden or violent blow; a dashing or sweeping stroke (obs.). b. spec. A stroke with a thong or whip. 2. a. The flexible part of a whip; now sometimes in narrower sense, the piece of whipcord or the like forming the extremity of this.
 - v. <u>Flog</u> v. 1. a. *trans*. To beat, whip; to chastise with repeated blows of a rod or whip.
 - G. His own countrymen chose a murderer over Him (Luk 23:13-25).
 - H. He was delivered to be killed because of envy (Mar 15:10).
 - I. He was crucified and mocked while He hung on the cross (Mat 27:33-44).
 - J. He was forsaken by God as He was punished for our sins (Mat 27:45-46; Isa 53:4-7, 10-12).
 - K. When He had made propitiation for our sins, He gave up the ghost and died (Joh 19:30; Rom 5:8-11).
 - L. Through all that, He never sinned (1Pe 2:21-24).
- 8. Jesus was resurrected three days later.
 - A. When He suffered sufficiently for the sins of His people, He gave up His life (Joh 10:15).
 - B. Three days later, as God, He took up His life again and rose from the dead (Joh 10:17-18; Mar 16:9; 1Co 15:4).
 - C. He ascended into heaven to reign at the right hand of God (Mar 16:19).
 - D. He is going to return without sin unto salvation to them that look for Him (**Heb** 9:28).
